Since I have had some teaching experience, I know that this is the most daunting task the teacher is confronted with. Furthermore, this is a task the teacher has to fulfill every day anew. No lesson is the same, and today your class can be totally different than the day before. Students' attitude and participation in the classroom can fall from astonishing to frustrating within moments. To be aware of the classroom vibe is most crucial to teaching success. Standing in front of the classroom, the teacher has to be able to adapt to the students' condition, to engage with them and to arouse their interest; in short, the teacher has to be aware of his or her audience. As a teacher, you need to be able to open a communicative channel that allows you to convey your message adequately and at the same time reach your students. Both speaker and recipient have to feel comfortable with the channel and must be interested to keep this channel open. When this communicative approach becomes one-sided, the teaching will fail; either the teacher will not be able to perform in a comfortable way, or the students might not be willing to receive. This can be avoided if both sides cooperate with each other by "make[ing] your conversational contribution such as is required, at the stage at which it occurs, by the accepted purpose or direction of the talk exchange in which you are engaged" (Grice 24). Grice talks about five maxims of conversation that need to be respected to provide a fertile ground for conversation.

In today's foreign language (FL) education, FL teachers universally recognize the importance of fostering students' ability to communicate in the FL. However, existing assessments often do not sufficiently evaluate this crucial aspect. Instead, assessments primarily focus on formal language knowledge in isolation, disconnected from real-world communicative contexts. This misalignment between assessment practices and communicative objectives, which is particularly prevalent in the lower form of secondary education in the Netherlands, hampers effective FL teaching. The aim of this PhD research project was to gather insight into the potential of assessments to steer FL teaching practices. To this end, tools for developing communicative classroom-based assessment (CBA) programs were designed and implemented in practice, in close collaboration with FL teachers. The first study reported upon in this dissertation (Chapter 2) investigates which factors contribute to the identified lack of alignment between learning goals and assessment practices. The second study (Chapter 3) then shows how CBA-tools were co-designed to overcome the challenges FL teachers face when developing assessments. The third study (Chapter 4) explores how these tools were used by other FL teachers (who did not take part in the co-design process) to implement a communicative CBA program in their own context. In the final study (Chapter 5), effects of the newly designed CBA programs on teaching practices are investigated, taking both teachers' and students' perspectives into account. Findings reveal that assessing FL competencies in a more communicative way can transform teaching practices, placing communicative abilities at the heart of FL education. The focus of this paper is on the implementation of Dynamic Assessment (henceforth, DA) in the L2 classroom setting. DA is an approach to assessment and instruction derived from Vygotsky's theory of the Zone of Proximal Development (henceforth, ZPD). In what follows, we will first discuss briefly the concept of the ZPD and its realization in DA procedures; next we will briefly discuss the work of Reuven Feuerstein, whose work on DA is most directly relevant to the goal of the present article (for a discussion of other models of DA, see Lantolf and Poehner, 2004; Sternberg and Grigorenko, 2002); finally, we will compare DA to Formative Assessment (henceforth, FA) and will suggest how FA might be reconceptualized according to DA principles. In the language testing literature, FA is usually contrasted with Summative Assessment on the grounds that the former is intended to feed back into the teaching and learning process while the latter reports on the outcomes of learning (Bachman, 1990: 60-61). Moreover, FA procedures are generally considered to be less systematic and not as high-stakes as summative assessments. Following Rea-Dickins and Gardner (2000), however, we suggest that FA is not necessarily low-stakes and that it can be carried out quite systematically, yielding results that may be more systematic and revealing with regard to learner development than summative assessments.

This language teacher drew upon these two frameworks to navigate dual goals of instruction and assessment while providing mediation attuned to the ZPD of the learners. As students studied interrogative formation to complete the pedagogical task of an interview, the teacher alternated between these two frameworks based on her goal for each interaction. Class transcripts are analysed to reveal how these two complementary frameworks can be used in conjunction to meet both the students' and teacher's needs.

This article reports the efforts of an elementary school teacher of Spanish as a second language to implement principles of dynamic assessment (DA) in her daily interactions with learners. DA is based on Vygotsky's (1987) proposal of the zone of proximal development (ZPD), which underscores the developmental importance of providing appropriate support to learners to help them stretch beyond their independent performance. The particular approach to DA that the teacher followed reflected her interpretation of the ZPD as well as her knowledge of her instructional context and was arrived at through consultation with the present authors. In other words, her use of DA represents a unification of theory and practice, as advocated by Vygotsky, whereby theory offers a basis to guide practice but at the same time practice functions to refine and extend theory. Examples of the teacher's interactions with learners in her classroom are discussed with regard to the opportunities for development they create.

Teachers' feedback on exams was information on a task's objective, oral feedback, and model performances. When deciding on final grades, teachers use as evidence written tests and students' working in lessons. However, there were some differences between languages and syllabi. Teachers gave the final grades based on students' language proficiency at a given moment stressing the curricula's content areas related to language proficiency. At the same time, teachers indicated to be basing their grades on averages in all the different content areas. The study has implications for teachers' assessment literacy training and for exploring more in detail the factors impacting students' final grades.
