It is believed that the Aztecs worshipped a goddess of death that they alleged protected their departed loved ones, helping them into the next stages.

What is Catrina slang for? Posada's Calavera dons a fancy hat – in the European style and her name 'Catrina' comes from the slang 'catrin' which referred to a well-dressed man or woman.

What does Catrina mean in English? They also represent the family's willingness to celebrate life in honor of their loved one's death. Catrina is a Spanish word that translates as little corpse. It derives from the Italian word Caterina, which means little girl.
